

Player Development - Personal Health and Well-Being and First Aid











We have been hearing a lot about how important it is to fundraise for the club. Why do we need more money – doesn't our membership cover all our needs?



It is a key part of the role of the Chair and the Treasurer to ensure the club has sufficient funds to operate effectively.

We are very fortunate to have a strong membership and are grateful for the income that this brings to our club. However, our running costs includes such things as heating, lighting, pitch maintenance costs, affiliation fees for our players and rental costs for additional facilities to meet the everincreasing demand for space. Unfortunately, income from membership only covers about 65% of these costs. We need to generate additional income by other means to make up the shortfall. This is where our fundraising is used in the first instance. We encourage and expect teams to play their part in generating funds through events. We also depend greatly on our club and team sponsors; all of whom are advertised in the back pages of each quarterly newsletter and through our website and social media platforms. I'd personally like to thank all the businesses who sponsor, advertise and donate to our club. We strongly encourage you, our wider membership, to support those who support us - their financial support is vital to meet this funding gap - as is your ongoing support as members.

We had our highest ever return from our fundraising efforts last year and the importance of this to the club can't be overstated. As a bonus, many of the fundraising activities involved social events that lots of people could get behind and we want to encourage everyone to make a big effort this year to attend just one more club event. It's a small cost to you as an individual but it all adds up to make a huge difference to your club.

But all of this is short-term, it is literally about keeping the lights on; keeping the day-to-day cogs turning. It is important but it is not enough. I have huge ambitions for this club which includes taking a more long-term strategic look at our financial security. We need to be able to maintain the stable position we have brought the club into financially while also 'saving for a rainy day'. And that is all before we even think about developing our facilities, doing more, offering more, creating a legacy.

So, aren't there other ways to source money, like grants and loans that we can utilise for development work?

Unfortunately, the well of external funding is drying up. There was a time when EU money may have been an option but there are very limited opportunities out there any more and when a funding call opens the field is always very competitive. That said we have done much better than many clubs over the last few years with support from the Landfill Communities Fund (via Eastwoods Envirowaste) contributing massively to our development activity and more recently with a significant capital funding commitment from Lisburn and Castlereagh Council which will help us with our development Masterplan - provided we can match their contribution pound for pound.

I am very aware of the need to develop and improve our facilities but often funding opportunities emerge which require a club contribution in place to even allow us to apply. We need to make the club 'oven ready' and the projects 'spade ready' if we are to have any chance to meet future needs around facilities such as a club house. It is a longer-term ambition but I am totally committed to starting now even though these efforts may take many years to come to fruition.

Ok, so you seem to be saying that there needs to be something that sits in the background almost like a savings account in case we get an opportunity to develop something? $\int \int \int$

Yes, something like that. Those with long memories will recall the old 'Club Carryduff' fund which we recently wound up. It supported a huge amount of development activity. However, we believed it needed a refresh to be ready for newly emerging opportunities. So, what we need, and what is in place in many other clubs, and indeed at County level, is a sustainable fund that all members can buy into. It will operate in the background until we need to access the funding pot to avail of an opportunity to develop our facilities. It won't ever be used for day to day running costs because that is absolutely not its purpose, but this investment will be vital to improve facilities, which will in turn enhance team performance, foster a more vibrant community and attract more members.

And it should appeal equally to people who have a strong life-long affiliation to the club as well as those who are just starting to find us. It is the youngest members who have the most to gain from investing early in our future.

Yes, we have spent a lot of time planning this. We launched our new Sustainable Development Fund - Cairde Carryduff - at the end of last year and have already had significant interest. There is lots of information about this on our Website but what is important about it is that it can be tailored to match affordability. From as little as £10 per month up to £50 per month for the business option, there is an opportunity for everyone to get involved and invest collectively in our future success. We would really appreciate people signing up and also availing of the various benefits it brings. I am very happy to talk to anyone about how the Scheme works so would welcome a call at any time.



Development Sub-Committee has produced a highlevel plan – approved by the EC - to address the club's training and playing needs in the immediate future. These include:

- Floodlights at Pitch 3
- Fencing at Pitch 2
- Surface Improvements at Pitch 2
- New additional 3G facility at top end of Pitch 3

Site Masterplan - Phase 3 To be Agreed

On completion of Phase 2 remaining site needs will be reviewed by the Development Sub-Committee and proposals submitted to Executive Committee for approval

At the same time, we will continue to identify additional funding sources to complete these and other works.

This will include plans and planning approval for a new club house for which specific funding opportunities will need to be identified

Phase 2 Status: -

We are now waiting on our formal Letter of Offer from Lisburn & Castlereagh Council which will allow us to continue the works planned in this Phase.

We have just begun the procurement process to appoint a design team to consider how best to take forward the Phase 2 plans so as to maximise all available space while minimising disruption during the works.

Hopefully you will see some activity beginning to happen over the summer months.



School Liaison Officer

Since joining the club 4 years ago Fiona has been heavily involved in coaching underage, from Nursery to U8.5s and this year moving up to U10.5s. She has two young children who are both also involved in the club.

"It is a pleasure to accept the School Liaison Officer role this year. My two children attend St Ita's Primary and I am keen to bring Gaelic games to all schools in the Carryduff area. Having experienced it myself, it's wonderful to watch my children begin to develop enduring friendships through participation in Gaelic Games.




